






2. "Iceberg of our differences" ... WHO ARE WE as individuals? (Do this as an FCA club activity, too!)

10% of the iceberg is above the line: (*Differences about us that we can see*). 90% of the iceberg is below the line: (*Differences that we can't see*).



Diversity means all the ways we differ. It includes the readily visible differences and the underlying differences that may be below the surface.



"CROSS THE LINE" activity ... WHERE ARE YOU in experiencing some of these differences?

Many ways to do this...individually on a chart (see attached) – or use a chart upfront where individuals stand up to acknowledge or place a mark or put something in a jar or box.
